

# Tree Nursery wins award

Earlier this year the Little Assynt Tree Nursery project won national recognition for community involvement and professionalism. It was awarded Highly Commended in the Community Woodlands section of Scotland's Finest Woods Awards. Anna MacKay (CCWT's Chair) and Viv Halcrow (CALL Project Manager) received the award from Paul Wheelhouse, MSP, Minister for the Environment at a presentation at the Royal Highland Show in Edinburgh. This is the second time an award of this nature has come to Assynt. Back in 2004 CCWT was Commended in the Small Woods category for good forestry practice. Well done to all the Tree Nursery staff and volunteers for creating such a successful project.

## How wild can we go?

Lochinver School took part in a day of discovering How wild can we go? in Cullag Wood. The whole school spent time with the Highland Council Rangers, Cullag Wood Project Officer and Tree Nursery Outreach Officer exploring and finding out about the different kinds of animals that live and used to live in the area. If you had been wandering around Assynt several hundred years ago you may have come across bears, lynx, wolves, beavers, red squirrels along with more familiar red deer, badgers and foxes. This activity was part of a larger event discussing whether reintroduction of once common species should be happening in Scotland. An evening debate

organised by local author Mandy Haggith, at Glencanisp Lodge was well attended by those who came to hear opinions of experts such as Roy Dennis, who has been involved with reintroduction projects and Jim Crumley, nature writer and author of The Last Wolf.

### Trees of Cullag Wood Scots Pine (*Pinus sylvestris*)

The Scots pine is the iconic tree of the Caledonian Pine Forest. In Scotland it grows to typically 20 metres in height with some reaching 27 metres. The bark is a distinguishing feature, in young trees being paper thin and orange-red in colour with mature bark darker and consisting of deeply fissured layered plates.

The needles which are blue green in colour and about 5 cm long, last about 2-3 years falling in September/October. Each tree carries male and female flowers appearing in May. A mature tree will produce cones every 3-5 years. The shape of a Scots pine is very variable ranging from the young conical forms to mature flat or round topped shapes. The trunks also differ being either straight and tall through to various multiple trunked spreading shapes.

The timber was used for building purposes and popular folklore prevented the trees being felled during a waning moon. This had an affect on the sap content which when high would reduce the decay rate of the timber.

## A major step forward for the CALL Landscape Partnership

News has just been released that the CALLP application to the Heritage Lottery Fund for £3 million has been approved. This funding is to cover a period of 5 years and will help to deliver the Landscape Partnership's projects in the Coigach and Assynt areas. Work will now begin with the recruitment and employment of a Development Manager and Assistant to develop the projects fully for stage 2 of the process and to find that ever-important match funding. The projects will start in 2015 with further direct employment opportunities and requirement for local contractors and consultants.

CCWT's role within the partnership is to lead the Outdoor and Woodland Learning project. The aim is to work closely with the local schools and other CALL partners to deliver high quality outdoor learning integrated within the curriculum in line with the

Highland Council and Scottish Government's strategies.
